Obedience From the Heart

"But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness," Rom. 6:17-18.

Formerly, the servants of God at Rome had been "servants of sin," but they became "the servants of righteousness." The change made in their condition was due to their having "obeyed from the heart" the "form of doctrine...delivered" them, which was the "gospel of Christ." cf. Rom. 1:16. This shows that the "gospel of Christ," in order to save the sinner, has to obeyed by the sinner. But this obedience must be "from the heart." The expression "from the heart" does not simply denote an inner condition of the heart, but rather it refers to obedience that came from the heart.

The "*heart*," as it is used here, has reference to that part of man that: (a) desires, Matt. 5:28; (b) perceives or understands, John 12:40; © reasons, Mark 2:6; (d) intends, Heb. 4:12; (e) that has faith, Mark 11:23; (f) and purposes, Acts 11:23. Thus, it refers not to a fleshly organ, but rather to that part of man that has emotions, reason, and will.

Hence, "obedience from the heart" denotes obedience that results from knowledge, or understanding. This is why the great commission demands that preaching, or teaching, precede baptism. Cf. Matt. 28:18-20). One's "obedience to the faith" (Rom. 1:5) has to be based upon an understanding of what God requires, or else it is not obedience "from the heart," and is therefore invalid.

This necessarily proves that infant baptism is unscriptural. An infant, void of Biblical understanding, can not obey "from the heart." Paul said "Ye have obeyed from the heart;" he did not say "your parents obeyed for you from their heart." This also disproves the doctrine of salvation by "faith only." Faith, or understanding, is that which leads to obedience and is not that which saves by itself; faith "alone" is "dead," James 2:17.

No one is a true member of the church of Christ unless he has first "*obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered*," We invite you to come and study with us. We have no theological ax to grind, or creed book to uphold. We simply seek a "*thus saith the Lord*." -B. Witherington
