### The Devices of Satan

#### Introduction:

- 1. 2 Corinthians 2:6-11; Eph. 6:11.
- 2. Concerning 2 Cor. 2:6-11:
  - a. In his first letter to the church at Corinth Paul rebuked the church for having among its membership a brother who had "his father's wife," I Cor. 5:1; a case of incest in the local church. Paul commanded that they deal with this brother in a forthright manner, I Cor. 5:4-5.
  - b. Between the writing of the first and second epistles to the church at Corinth the brother who had been withdrawn from had evidently repented; now it was time to forgive him and confirm their love to him, 2 Cor. 2: 7-8.
  - c. They needed to take this approach lest Satan should gain the "advantage," 2 Cor. 2:11, for Paul said "we are not ignorant of his devices."
    - (1) "Devices" is from noema, and denotes thought, that which is thought out. It refers to a well thought out plan that is "especially for evil plans and purposes," A.T.Robertson, Word Pictures in the New Testament.
- 3. Concerning Ephesians 6:11:
  - a. In the context of this verse Paul was stressing the necessity of Christian's armor, the reason being that we might "be able to stand against the wiles of the devil."
  - b. "Wiles" denotes "cunning arts, deceit, craft, trickery," Thayer.
- 4. These words together depict Satan as:
  - a. A schemer, a plotter, as one who is alert to every opportunity.
  - b. One who does not work openly, for he knows that his cause is indefensible, illogical, and unreasonable; hence, he cannot afford to parade under his true colors.
  - c. An enemy of Christians. Indeed he is! I Peter 5:8
    - (1) Satan recognizes no one as being too powerful or too righteous for him to attack or to tempt. Cf. Matt. 4:1-12; Hebrews 4:15.

### Discussion:

### I. Other Facts Concerning Satan. He is:

- A. Our "adversary," I Peter 5:8.
- B. Called "the god of this world," 2 Cor. 4:4.
- C. Called "the prince of the power of the air," Eph. 2:2.
- D. Called "the accuser of our brethren," Rev. 12:10. Cf. Job 1:6-11.
- E. Called "the enemy," Matt. 13:39.
- F. "A Murderer," John 8:44.
- G. A "Liar" and the "father" of lies, John 8:44

**Note**: In view of who Satan is, and his nature, it is not surprising that he would have evil plans for us; "devices" designed to weaken, or even destroy, our faith, and to lead us further and further from God. He has the worst possible intentions for each of us!

# II. Some "Devices" of Satan.

- A. Deception, Genesis 3:1-6.
  - 1. Eve was deceived, I Timothy 2:13-14. Cf. I John 2:15-17.
  - 2. We are commanded to not be deceived, Gal. 6:7; I Cor. 6:9-11.
  - 3. Yet Satan, through his preachers, continues to deceive people every day, 2 Cor. 11:12-13.
    - a. This is why we are commanded to "try the spirits," I John 4:1.
    - b. This is why we should follow the example of the Bereans, Acts 17:11.
- B. Distraction, or diversion.
  - 1. Distraction through our work, Luke 10:38-42.
  - 2. Distraction through cares and pleasures, Luke 8:14.
  - 3. Distractions through desires that are at variance with God's will, James 1:13-15.
    - a. This is what happened to David in 2 Samuel 11.
- C. Division.
  - 1. God wants His people to be united! John 17:19-21; I Cor. 1:10-11; Eph. 4:3; Phil. 1:27.

- 2. Yet religious division is the norm; it is all around us, and many people even thank God for so many denominations, for this gives everyone the opportunity to worship in the church of his choice!
- 3. Divisions occur because of:
  - a. False doctrine, I Tim. 4:1-3; Eph. 4:4-6.
  - b. Conflicting personalities, Eph. 4:1-3; Romans 15:1,5-6.
- 4. But keep in mind the fact that it is Satan who tries to drive a wedge between God's people!

### D. Doubt.

- 1. Heb. 3:12
- 2. Matt. 14:31.
- 3. Satan tries to take the word of God out of people's hearts, Luke 8:12.
- 4. Today, because of so many false teachers, teachers and professors of humanism, and evolution, Satan is having a field day! So many of our young people in particular, upon leaving home, are losing their faith.
- 5. We must do what we can to instill faith in the hearts of our children; the best way is by teaching them. Note Rom. 10:17.
- E. Discouragement.
  - 1. Numbers 21:4-5; Deut. 1:21,22.
  - 2. Discouraged because of:
    - a. The bearers of bad news.
    - b. Adverse circumstances, Num. 21:4.
    - c. Constant criticism, Num. 20:2-5, 7-11.
      - (1) "If Christians spent as much time praying as they do grumbling, they would have nothing to grumble about.

# F. Disappointment.

- 1. Because of being disenchanted, disillusioned, unfulfilled expectations, etc.
- 2. When things don't go the way we think they should we often engage in that "stinking thinking," and say to ourselves "what's the use."
  - a. Job had to be disappointed by his three friends, whom he called "miserable comforters," Job 16:2.
  - b. Paul was doubtlessly disappointed in John Mark, Acts 13:13, and Demas, 2 Tim. 4:10.
  - c. Think how disappointed Jesus was in Judas, Matt. 26:14-15, and Peter, Matt. 26:69-75.
- G. Delay.
  - 1. Acts 24:25; 26:18; Psalm 119:60.

## III. How to win the Battle against Satan.

- A. Through knowledge, Psalm 119:9,11.
- B. By putting on the whole armor of God, Eph. 6:10,11.
- C. Resistance, James 4:7; I Peter 5:8-9.
- D. By Keeping things in perspective, Matt. 19:26; Romans 8:18,28; 2 Cor. 4:17.

### **Conclusion:**

- 1. One of the best ways to rid Satan of control over your life is to start out by obeying the gospel.
  - a. This is not to say that Christianity is a life of ease and void of temptation, difficulty, or burdens, Matt. 16:24.
  - b. Yet two verses later, Matt. 16:26, we are made to see the importance of obedience.
