The word "<u>all</u>" includes "the whole of (with reference to quantity, extent, duration, amount, or degree); ...everything...a totality of things or qualities..." (**The American College Dictionary**, P. 33).

It's use in the Scriptures is very significant. Jesus has "all power," or authority (Matt. 28:18), which leaves none for a priest, pope, rabbi, clergymen, pastor, or any other person. "All things" (Matt. 28:20), which the Lord has "commanded" must b taught and observed. We must "do all in the name of the Lord" (Col. 3:17), suggesting that we must not "do many things (or any thing, b.w.) for which we have no authority." We are to "prove all things" (I Thess. 5:21) lest error be taught and accepted. The apostles were guided into "all truth" (John 16:13), which proves that any "later day revelation," creed book, manual, or dogma, which has been written since the time of the apostles is not a part of "all truth," is erroneous and must therefore be discarded. Let's watch that word "all." It is important!
