# THE SERVICE OF LEADERSHIP (Part 1)

### Introduction

- 1) Those who occupy positions of *leadership* have a vital and serious responsibility
  - a) Earthly leaders (Prov. 16:12)
  - b) Spiritual leaders (Acts 20:28)
- 2) One of the most important aspects of leadership is that of *service* (1 Kgs. 12:6-7)
  - a) Those in authority often overlook or ignore their duty to humbly serve (vv. 14-15a)
- b) Others lead blindly, or deliberately, into the danger of sin (Isa. 3:12b; 9:16; Matt. 15:14)
- 3) Need to examine the *service of leadership* in society, the church, and the home
  - a) Leaders encourage submissive service by being good servants themselves
- 4) First examine Jesus as the perfect example of a serving lord and master

### I) JESUS – The Perfect Service of Leadership

- A) **By Example** (Jn. 13:1-17)
  - Was the teacher and lord of the disciples position of leadership and authority (v. 13)
    a) Also fully aware of the authority and exaltation that was to be given to Him after His suffering (vv. 1-3; 17:1-2; Matt. 28:18)
  - 2) Willingly and humbly performed the common servant task of washing the disciples' feet (vv. 4-11)
  - 3) Lesson: If leaders serve those they lead, all should seek to serve others (vv. 12-15)a) Happiness is found in serving the needs of others
  - 4) Father and Christ daily serve our physical and spiritual needs (Acts 14:17; 17:25; Jn. 3:16; Jas. 1:17; 2 Pet. 1:3)
- B) By Instruction (Matt. 20:24-28; Mk. 10:41-45; Lk. 22:24-26)
  - 1) Occasions for teaching happened when resentment (Matt, Mk) and rivalry (Lk) arose among the disciples
  - 2) "It shall not be so among you" (vv. 25-26a selfish tyrannical rule)
    - a) "Lord it over" (Gk. *katakurieuo*) to lord against, control, subjugate (Strong); high-handed rule (Vincent)
    - b) "Exercise authority" (Gk. *katexousiazo*) to wield full privilege over (Strong); play the tyrant (Robertson)
  - 3) Whoever would be first and great, being a servant is required opposite of worldly leadership that dominates others with intimidation, bullying, and threatening
    - a) Jesus uses Himself as the perfect example of a leader servant came not to be served as Lord and Master, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many (Phil. 2:5-8)

### II) Godly Qualities of Leaders Who Serve

- A) Treat others as one would want to be treated (Matt. 7:12)
- B) Be careful with words (Prov. 21:23; 29:11)
- C) Persistence (Gal. 6:9)
- D) Seek peace and reconciliation (Rom. 12:18)
- E) Emphasize obeying the law (Gal. 6:2)
- F) Integrity (Psa. 78:72)
- G) Unselfishness (Phil. 2:3-4)
