MOSES (II): MAKING EXCUSES

Introduction

- 1) At age 40, Moses killed an Egyptian to defend and avenge his brethren (Ex. 2:11-12; Acts 7:23-24)
 - a) With this action, he had made the choice to renounce his Egyptian upbringing and to suffer affliction with the people of God (Heb. 11:24-26)
 - b) He suddenly found himself misunderstood by his brethren and hunted by Pharaoh (Ex. 2:14-15a; Acts 7:25-28)
- 2) Moses flees to the land of Midian (Ex. 2:15; Acts 7:29)
 - a) Moses fearfully leaves Egypt knowing he is in danger Pharaoh sought to kill him
 - b) Moses leaves his Egyptian heritage and his Hebrew brethren, fleeing to a faraway land to sojourn, where God would raise him up as a man and leader of great faith who would learn not fear the wrath of man but to put his trust in the invisible God

I) Dwelling in Midian and Encountering God in the Burning Bush (Exodus 2:15-3:10)

- A) Moses meets Jerthro [priest of Midian], dwells with him, and marries his daughter, Zipporah (Ex. 2:15b-22; Acts 7:29); tending flocks learned patience needed as a shepherd (Ex. 3:1)
- B) God "looked" acknowledged the burdens and groanings of His people in Egypt (Ex. 2:23-25)
- C) After forty years (Acts 7:30), the Angel [messenger, word] of the Lord (divine person of Godhead) appears to Moses in a bush that burned but was not consumed (Ex. 3:2-4)
 - 1) Moses in the presence of God stands on "holy ground" as God reveals Himself (3:5-6)
 - 2) God knows the oppression of His people and has *come down* to deliver them (3:7-9; cf. Gen. 15:13-14; 46:3-4; 50:24)
 - 3) God tells Moses that he will be sent to bring the people of God out of Egypt (3:10)

II) **The Excuses of Moses** (Exodus 3:11–4:17)

- A) "Who am I?" (Ex. 3:11-12)
 - 1) Humble attitude, but also an attitude of uselessness, insignificance, weakness
 - 2) God's answer: "I will certainly be with you" makes Moses' work significant a) Not worry about self, but emphasize the Lord and His will makes anyone successful
- B) "When they ask, 'What is His name?' what shall I say to them?" (Ex. 3:13-22)
 - 1) God's answer: "I AM WHO I AM...I AM has sent me to you" a) Applied by Jesus to Himself (Jn. 8:58, 24)
 - 2) Tells Moses what to make known to the people, and what will take place in Egypt
- C) "But suppose they will not believe me or listen to my voice?" (Ex. 4:1-9)
 - 1) God had already informed Moses that the people would heed his voice (3:18)
 - 2) God's answer equips Moses with three signs: a) rod turns into serpent and back again, b) hand put in bosom turns leprous and back again, c) river water will turn into blood
 - 3) Signs are to be done "that they may believe that the Lord God...has appeared to you" (Ex. 4:5) demonstrates basic purpose of miracles (cf. Mk. 16:20; Heb. 2:4)
- D) "I am not eloquent...but I am slow of speech and slow of tongue" (Ex. 4:10-12)
 - 1) Literally, "heavy in mouth and heavy in tongue" not fluent in speech (cf. 6:12)
 - 2) God's answer: "I will be with you mouth and teach you what you shall say" (cf. Matt. 10:19-20; 1 Cor. 2:1); God gives the message for man to speak (1 Pet. 4:11)
- E) Moses' final plea: "Please send someone else!" (Ex. 4:13-17)
 - 1) Lord is now angry, but determined Moses disobedient and stubborn; Aaron, Moses' brother, will meet him and go with him to be a "mouth" for Moses (cf. 7:1-2)

Conclusion

When God needs us, He does not accept excuses or "no". Moses now prepared to go to Egypt (Ex. 4:18-20; Heb. 11:27); so also we must prepare to do the work the Lord needs done today.
